


URI BLEIER – THIS BODY OF MINE



The Name of the Rose meets 16th century feudal Japan

Master of the Japanese historical thriller, David B. Gil has written bestselling, multi-awarded novels translated into several languages. 1579. Year 7 of the Tenshō era. Jesuit monks are being systematically targeted in a series of cruel, ritualistic murders. Kudō Kenjirō and Father Martín Ayala are to investigate those murders, but soon discover the job is not as straightforward as it first appeared; dark forces conspire to hamper the visitor's endeavours. Keeping the Jesuit priest alive becomes a duty that not only threatens Kenjirō's honour, but the survival of his family. Any failure on his part would have devastating consequences for them all.

Hailing from very different worlds but thrown together by fate, father Ayala and Kenjirō must travel through a country torn apart by war and conspiracy. Their mission is fundamental not only to the survival of Christianity in Japan, but the very future of the country.

Set in a Soviet-controlled town in the summer of 1977, this atmospheric coming-of-age story follows a perceptive young girl who senses she belongs in a world that goes beyond her own. When she discovers that another neighbor shares her hazy recollections of a different place, a quiet mystery unfolds. Reality is put at stake, this novel has a fantastic component that mixes with the reality of everyday life under communism.

Polyphonic literary fiction meets summer nights




ENRIC PARDO – THE MAN OF THE HOUSE

It speaks of present mothers and absent fathers, of what it means to be a man and what a man is expected to do, of what it means to be a woman and the roles imposed on her. At its heart, the novel is a literary tribute to the mother, who was forced into her role by a society that left her no choice.
